Introduction

By policy, the Northlake Police Department requires a yearly analysis of procedures involving all Use of Force incidents to determine patterns or trends that could indicate training needs, equipment upgrades, racial or other biases, and/or recommended policy modification. This report is a quarterly snapshot of the number of Use of Force incidents occurring year to date for 2025.

Empty Hand Control (EHC) – This is basically the use of bare hands and no weapons. If words and an officer’s presence are not enough, then officers may need to get physically involved. This usually involves what is referred to as, “empty-hand techniques.” There are no use of weapons or equipment at this level. Instead, an officer may use “empty hand techniques” by using his or her hands to hold or restrain a person who is resisting arrest in order to achieve the desired results. (*Policy Revision: 01/6/2022*)

Firearm Drawn/Pointed (FD/P) – This is when an officer draws and points his firearm at a suspect who has presented a serious threat to the responding officer(s) and/or other persons and there is no time to use a lesser degree of force or attempts to de-escalate the incident further. In these instances, the officer has demonstrated restraint and the firearm is not discharged. Rather, the firearm is holstered after the suspect has been detained and the threat no longer exists.
